# South West, WA

Designated Area Migration Agreement DAMA



This document lists the skills assessment criteria for occupations in the South West, WA DAMA region that apply for the purposes of the TSS, SESR and ENS visa programs.

The DAMA requirements have changed recently. For some occupations, applicants can apply without a qualification if they can provide evidence of relevant work experience at a suitable skill level.

Non-ANZSCO Occupations Applicants nominating the Non-ANZSCO Indicative Skill Level 4 occupations outlined in **Table 1** must meet the following requirements:

- Have at least a relevant AQF (or equivalent)
   Certificate II or higher qualification; or
- Have at least one year of full time (38 hours per week) relevant work experience.

#### Additional Work Experience That Can Be Assessed

- Have at least two years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the TSS and SESR visa programs; or
- Have at least one year of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) undertaken in Australia for the TSS visa program; or
- Have at least three years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the ENS visa program.

Applicants nominating the ANZSCO Skill Level 4 occupations that are not on an eligible list of skilled occupations outlined in **Table 2** must meet the following requirements:

- Have at least an AOF Certificate II: or
- Have at least one year of full-time
   (38 hours per week) relevant work experience.

#### Additional Work Experience That Can Be Assessed

- Have at least two years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the TSS and SESR visa programs; or
- Have at least one year of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) undertaken in Australia for the TSS visa program; or
- Have at least three years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the ENS visa program.

Applicants nominating the Specific ANZSCO Skill Level 5 occupations that are not on an eligible list of skilled occupations as outlined in **Table 3** must meet the following skills requirements:

- > Have at least an AQF Certificate I; or
- Have at least one year of full-time
   (38 hours per week) relevant work experience.

#### Additional Work Experience That Can Be Assessed

- Have at least two years of relevant full time work experience (38 hours per week) for the TSS and SESR visa programs; or
- Have at least one year of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) undertaken in Australia for the TSS visa program; or
- Have at least three years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the ENS visa program

Applicants nominating the General ANZSCO Skill Level 5 occupations that are not on an eligible list of skilled occupations outlined in **Table 4** must meet the following skills requirements:

- > Have at least an AQF Certificate I; or
- Have at least one year of full-time
   (38 hours per week) relevant work experience.

### Additional Work Experience That Can Be Assessed

- Have at least two years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the TSS and SESR visa programs; or
- Have at least one year of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) undertaken in Australia for the TSS visa program; or
- Have at least three years of relevant work experience (38 hours per week) for the ENS visa program.



#### 1. What is a DAMA?

A Designated Area Migration Agreement (DAMA) is a formal agreement between the Australian Government and a regional, state or territory authority, providing flexibility for regions to respond to their unique labour market needs.

DAMA allows employers to sponsor skilled and semi-skilled overseas professionals for positions they are unable to fill with local workers. Each state/territory DAMA is tailored to address current and emerging labour market shortages and local terms and conditions of employment.

#### Key elements of DAMAs include:

- A broad range of occupations that reflect the state/territory skilled and semi-skilled shortages, with no caveats to apply but, rather, concessions that may apply.
- English language, age and salary concessions for some occupations.

### 2. Does an applicant need a skills assessment for DAMA?

A skills assessment is required for applications lodged for the occupations on the DAMA Occupation Lists. This is to ensure that the individual has the necessary skills to perform the tasks of their chosen occupation under DAMA.

VETASSESS does not offer skills assessments for the Northern Territory Designated Area Migration Agreement. Please approach the Northern Territory government or the Department of Home Affairs with any queries in regard to this.

### 4. My occupation is not listed on your website.

Please check on the DAMA website of your chosen region to ensure that VETASSESS is the relevant assessing authority.

## 5. What are VETASSESS skills assessment criteria for my chosen occupation?

For occupations with DAMA specific criteria, refer to the individual DAMA information sheet on our website. For other professional occupations that are listed on DAMA Occupation Lists, please refer to the professional occupations list. The process is the same as the standard skills assessments and when applying online, please select the 'Skills Assessment for Migration' category. When applying online, select the 'DAMA' category.

#### 6. What documents do I need?

### 7. I don't know which DAMA to select?

In order to process your DAMA skills assessment, it is required that you nominate the area you will be working in under the DAMA agreement. Please visit DAMA websites for more details.

# 8. I have already applied for a skills assessment under one DAMA. Can I use the skills assessment for another DAMA?

Our skills assessment outcome letters for occupations with DAMA specific criteria specify the relevant DAMA region. Please contact the relevant DAMA authority to confirm the validity of the letter.

## 9. How will I be notified of the progress of my application?

If any additional information is required you will be contacted by email. Once your application is completed, you will receive an email notification to download the outcome letter from the online application portal.





### 10. Can I change my occupation or DAMA region?

Please ensure you nominate the right occupation and DAMA region before submitting your application online. If you have incorrectly chosen your occupation and/or DAMA region, you will need to withdraw your existing application and submit a new one. Change of occupation requests will incur an administration fee.

### 11. How long is a DAMA skills assessment valid for?

Three years from the issue date.

## 12. I have already completed a full skills assessment with VETASSESS. Can I use this for DAMA?

For occupations with DAMA specific criteria, you will need to re-apply under the DAMA category. For other occupations which do not have DAMA specific criteria, yes. Please ensure that your chosen occupation is available under the relevant DAMA agreement.

# 13. Can we apply for GSM migration assessments at the same time as a DAMA assessment?

Multiple applications across various assessment types are accepted.

## 14. If I require a skills assessment for DAMA purposes, how do I apply?

You can apply via the VETASSESS website, under Skills Assessment for Migration. Some occupations are listed for both general skills assessment and for a DAMA. If you are applying for DAMA purposes, make sure you choose the relevant application type category.



For applications under occupations with DAMA specific criteria please select the DAMA category.

Important Note — The following Information Sheet is for your reference only and should be used as a guide to assist with your Skills Assessment application to VETASSESS. This information is subject to change. Please note that a Skills Assessment of the qualification involves assessment of both the qualification level and content. Qualifications are assessed according to the guidelines published by the Australian Government Department of Education. The employment assessment involves determining the skill level and relevance of the tasks undertaken. Integrity checks may be conducted to verify the qualification and employment claims made in an application.



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
